

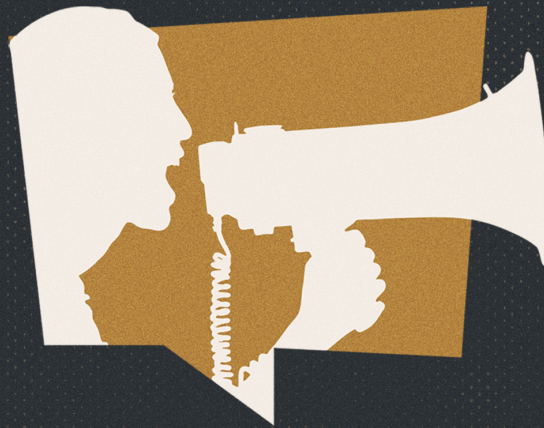

I remember years ago when I was promoted to my first managerial position, one of the first pieces of advice I received was to "get your team to work for you." I asked, "How do I do that?" I was told, it was simple. Get to know your people, their needs, and where they need your support for coaching. Seemed simple enough. The goal, after all, is

to get the people that report to you promoted.

I know that is a different type of promotion than we are discussing in our Connecting Point question today, but there are some valuable lessons from that experience. First and most importantly, you need to get to know one another to have a relationship.

Second, you need a relationship built on trust that allows for open dialogue.



I do will it. Be made clean.

Mk 1:41

This Scripture from the Gospel talks about an encounter that Jesus had with a leper. We need to remember that leprosy was not only considered a disease but a ritual impurity—almost like a symbol of sin! Here, Jesus

takes away the sin and reconciles the leper's relationship with the community.

This is such a beautiful scene because it foreshadows Jesus' own passion when he becomes a leper, made impure by our sins, and dies on the cross. He reconciles us with the Father. There's that word—reconcile. In the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we receive the grace and “armor” we need to go out and spread the Good News. We know that the sins we commit distance ourselves from

the Lord. Through the sacrament's strength, we can promote Christ to our brothers and sisters.

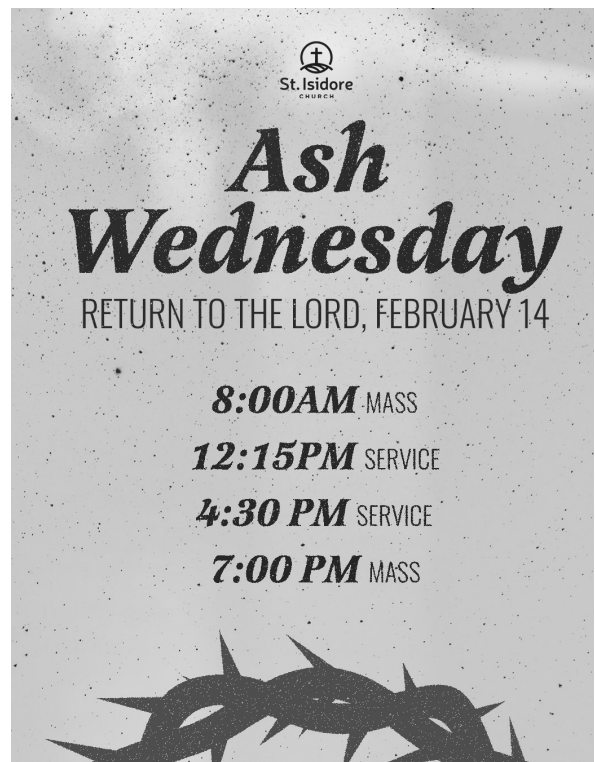
How can I promote Christ instead of myself? By turning away from sin and longing to have a close relationship with the Lord. Through Reconciliation and prayer, we grow in our faith. Living as a witness to the Lord is then apparent to those around us. Making personal invitations and being joyful missionary disciples helps to “promote” Christ and be living proofs of his Goodness.

► Distribution of Ashes

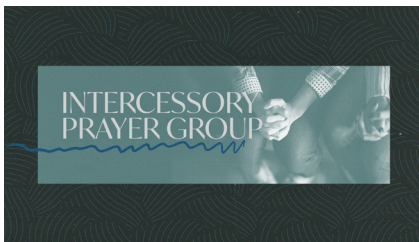

Catholics (and some Protestant denominations) mark the beginning of Lent with the reception of ashes on Ash Wednesday. Symbolizing our mortality, penance, and humility, ashes are a sign of our faith, reminding us (and potentially others) to re-evaluate the way we are living our lives according to the teachings of Christ. We wear ashes on our foreheads as an acknowledgement of our own imperfections and our need for God's mercy and grace. Ashes also serve as a visible sign of our commitment to spiritual renewal and preparation for the celebration of Easter and the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Even though it's February, and some may have already decided they couldn't keep up the momentum for the health related resolutions they made for the new year, it's not too late to get back on track. We all have good intentions to eat better and exercise more, but it's hard to stay focused on our health goals when it's cold and dreary outside. In the winter, when it gets dark early and the weather is cold and icy, we tend to want to stay inside, eat comfort foods and curl up with a good book or watch TV.

But, even though you may have disbanded your new year's resolution, rethink that decision and choose a "small" resolution that's easy to accomplish that will improve your health. Why not give one of

these a try?

Eat more vegetables. Eating more vegetables will help fill you up and leave less room for junk food like chips, ice cream, and sweets. Vegetables will also help you get the vitamins, nutrients, and fiber you need to help you stay healthy and regular.

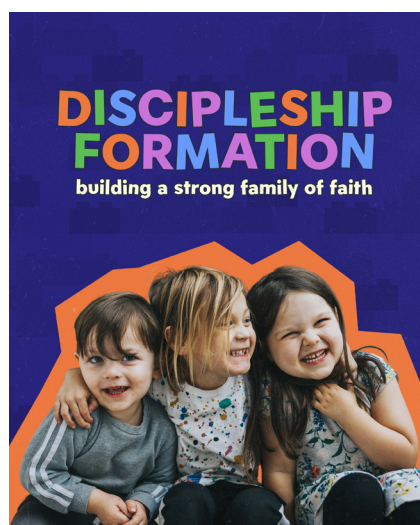
Get enough sleep. Go to bed at the same time each day and get at least 7-8 hours each night. Avoid using computers, phones, caffeine drinks, and other things that may stimulate you prior to sleep.

Take care of your mental health. Pray, meditate, exercise, eat well and stay hydrated, practice gratitude, focus on positivity, forgive others, stay

connected with friends and family, avoid stressful social media, and find ways to relieve stress. Do things that you enjoy.

Cut down or eliminate alcohol. Eliminating alcohol will lower your blood pressure, give you better skin, help with memory, and healthy sleep habits.

Prioritize doctor visits. Stick to scheduled physicals and health screenings (mammograms, colonoscopies, prostate and skin screenings, and eye exams) to help catch illnesses early and keep medical conditions under control. If something is hurting you, don't ignore it and have a healthcare provider check it out.

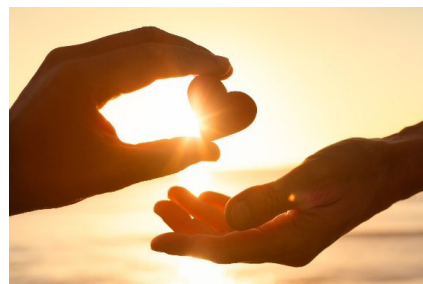

► COVID-19 Vaccine Myths and Facts

After dodging COVID for 3.5 years, I ended up contracting it after Thanksgiving! And, I have to say, it caught me off guard since I couldn't recall being around anyone that was visibly sick, and had recently received the latest COVID vaccine. After testing positive for COVID, I was placed on an antiviral and steroid medications and was sick for about a week, but luckily recovered without much issue.

Some people think we are "over" COVID, but we are not, and probably this is something we will have to deal with indefinitely. I know there are people who refuse to take the COVID vaccines, or those who took the initial vaccines and don't want to take anymore, but the current recommendation is that we DO take the vaccines. It's hard to determine if I would have been sicker if I didn't take the vaccines, but in retrospect, I am glad I did, even if I got sick.

So in light of my recent illness, I thought I would review some of the myths and facts regarding the COVID-19:

MYTH: The COVID-19 vaccine doesn't work. That is why they keep changing it.

FACT: Data shows that COVID-19 vaccines protect people against severe illness and death due to COVID-19. Like the flu vaccine, scientists work to predict what

variant of the COVID-19 virus will be circulating this season and tailor the vaccine to those variants, making the vaccine more relevant to the current season.

MYTH: You don't need the updated COVID-19 vaccine if you've already had two shots.

FACT: Scientists learned that the COVID-19 virus can change over time and the level of protection from older vaccine versions may not be as protective. The best way to protect yourself against severe illness, hospitalization, and death is to remain up to date with the current recommended COVID-19 vaccine.

MYTH: You don't need the COVID-19 vaccine because the pandemic is over.

FACT: The pandemic period may be over, but COVID-19 is here to stay. People are still getting COVID-19 and people over 65 are at a higher risk of getting seriously ill, being hospitalized, and dying of it.

MYTH: You can't get a COVID-19 vaccine with your annual flu shot

FACT: You can safely get several vaccines at the same time. Check with your provider which ones you need. They may include influenza, RSV, pneumococcal (pneumonia) and COVID-19.

MYTH: If you've already had COVID-19, you have natural immunity

and don't need the updated COVID-19 vaccine.

FACT: People who already had COVID-19 and do not stay up to date with updated COVID-19 vaccines after they recover are more likely to get COVID-19 again, than those who remain up to date.

MYTH: I don't want to get the vaccine because it doesn't work and vaccinated people have still gotten it.

FACT: COVID-19 vaccination lowers your risk of severe illness and death if you get infected. Compared to people who are up to date with their COVID-19 vaccinations, unvaccinated people are more likely to get COVID-19, be hospitalized, and die.

MYTH: COVID-19 no longer makes people very sick. It is like a cold, so I don't need the latest vaccine.

FACT: An increase in the number of people vaccinated against COVID-19 has contributed to lowered hospitalizations rates and deaths, however, significant numbers of people are still dying. Nine out of 10 deaths with COVID-19 happen in people older than 65 years of age. The vaccine significantly reduces the risk of severe illness and death

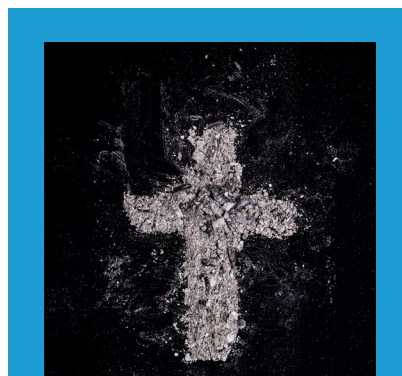

Did You Know? Ash Wednesday

The liturgical use of ashes originated in the Old Testament times. Ashes symbolized mourning, mortality, and penance. The early Church continued the usage of ashes for the same symbolic reasons. In the Middle Ages those who were about to die were laid on the ground on top of sackcloth sprinkled with ashes. The priest would bless the dying person with holy water, saying, "Remember that thou art dust and to dust thou shalt return." Then the priest asked, "Art thou content with sackcloth and ashes in testimony of thy penance before the Lord on the day of judgement?" To which the dying person replied, "I am content."

Eventually, the use of ashes was adapted to mark the beginning of Lent at least by the 8th century. Today as we begin the holy season of Lent we mourn and do penance for our sins, convert our hearts to the Lord, renew our Baptismal promises when we died to an old life and rose to a new life with Christ, and we strive to live the kingdom of God now and look forward to its fulfillment in heaven.

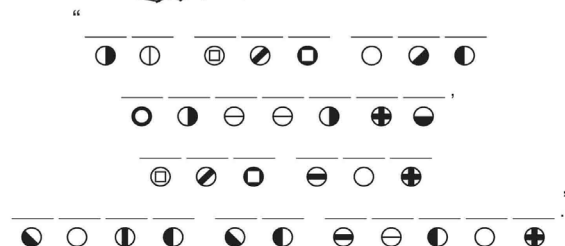

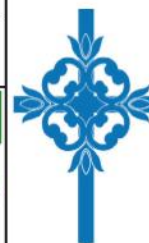
