time reading recipes and sampling their dishes, all of which take time and effort. In short, if we want to improve in life, it will involve some sacrifice on our part.

The same is true of wisdom. One becomes wise not by osmosis (simply sitting somewhere and absorbing the atmosphere) but by study, practice, reflection, discussion, and experimentation. Wisdom, like any skill, is acquired by deliberate action.

Whenever someone tells me that they "don't get much out of Mass on Sunday," I ask: "Do you pray privately every day?" It is important to distinguish between "private prayer" and "communal prayer." Private prayer is the time we spend with God by ourselves every day to reflect on God's presence in our lives. Silence is an important part of this prayer, as it is in silence that the Holy Spirit moves within us. Sunday Mass is a communal prayer. It is the time we join the entire community to praise and thank God and to experience Christ's presence in the community. We need both private and communal prayer. Without daily private prayer, we have very little to praise and

thank God for when we gather with the community at Sunday Mass. Without communal prayer, our private prayer can become selfcentered. God comes to us through the community. It is not helpful to see Sunday Mass as "my time with God this week." It is the time when we join the community in prayer.

We have heard complaints that there is too much talking in church before Mass begins. I think that it is fine to quietly greet friends as we enter the church or talk briefly with them. It connects us in worship. However, we should try to refrain from being too loud and disturbing those preparing in silence to enter into the liturgy. The Gathering Space should be used for longer conversations.

Of course, there is a difference when it comes to infants and little ones. I never mind it when they cry or are noisy in church. Parents cannot control it. I am extremely grateful to parents who bring the little ones to church. I know that it is not easy! Yet, our communal prayer is not complete without our children. It is crucial that our parish is "baby friendly" and that we go out of our way to thank and support our young families.





Told to the children of Fatima by Our Lady of the Rosary



Did You Know? Our Lady of Fatima

At Fatima, Portugal the Virgin Mary appeared to three shepherd children, Lucia dos Santos and her cousins Jacinta and Francisco Marto, on May 13, 1917, and in each subsequent month until October of that year. Mary told the children to say the rosary every day, to bring peace to the world and an end to the war. She also gave them this prayer to say after each mystery, "O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fire of hell. Lead all souls to heaven, especially those who are most in need." On the last day of the apparitions, a crowd of about 70,000 made up of believers, skeptics, and atheists witnessed the "Miracle of the Sun". On that day the rainy sky cleared up and the wet and muddy ground dried up. A transparent veil came over the sun, making it easy to look at, and multicolored lights were strewn across the landscape. The sun began to spin, twirling in the sky, and at one point appeared to veer toward the earth before jumping back to its place in the sky. The first newspaper to report this event with a full front page was an anti-Catholic, Masonic newspaper in Lisbon called O Seculo.

Each time I gather with our OCIA catechumens and candidates, I see the profound truth of the LORD's statement. This year's OCIA group truly reflects the vastness and grandeur of God's creation, ranging in age from 10 to 70 with family ties as far away as Massachusetts, Texas, and Bosnia, serving society with skills in culinary arts, pharmaceutical sales, football, and competitive dance. Each one is on a journey to join us as part of the mystical body of Christ! And I agree with the sentiments from this scripture passage; it would not be good for them to journey alone.

walking alone, we're forming a group of Parish Sponsors—travel guides, if you will—who will provide friendly faces and a warm welcome by being available to answer questions and point out things of interest to newcomers who are navigating their way in a large, diverse, and active Family of Parishes faith community. As a Parish Sponsor, we will only ask you to do four things:

Catholic brothers and sisters aren't

people, emotional wisdom, empathetic wisdom, and the like. But for those of us who are Christian, we want to acquire God's wisdom, which involves sacrifices of time and self. We must ask ourselves: What am I willing to give up as a human in order to grow in God's wisdom?

In many ways, we need to give up our own opinions, wants, needs, and desires and literally "die to self" to achieve God's wisdom. His wisdom does not merely come from books or memorizing facts and figures; it involves putting ourselves at the service of God and neighbor so that Christ shines through us.

God's wisdom sometimes calls us to be countercultural—to go against the grain of commonly held beliefs. Occasionally, we are invited to fight for the rights of those whom the world considers "nobodies." God's wisdom challenges us to view the world through the eyes of faith and see potential in others by looking beyond the obvious. Ultimately, growing in God's wisdom means becoming a person of service and going above and beyond—not just doing the bare minimum.

This week, ask the Lord what you need to give up in order to grow in God's wisdom.

10 Surprising Things That Happen When You Go to Adoration More Often - Part 2

Here are the first three ways that going to Adoration may impact you...

1. You develop a sense of awe and wonder


There is nothing like the atmosphere of a quiet chapel or church, the smell of incense and the splendor of the monstrance to help you understand the truth of what is happening in Adoration. We are truly before Jesus Christ, His Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity. The more you sink into that silence in front of the Host, the more you'll realize the only response is awe and wonder at the greatness of our God.

2. You experience peace in other areas of your life

Jesus said "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you." (John 14:27). The outward peace we can experience in Adoration (the quiet and the stillness) reaches much deeper. It leads to an inner peace that affects all areas of our lives. It doesn't mean everything in our life will be perfect and without suffering, but Christ's peace means we know the storms of life can't shake us.

3. You begin to look outwardly Jesus told us to "love one another as I have loved you". (John 13:34) Spending time in Adoration connects us to the whole world – after all, we're spending time with the Creator of all things! More time praising and adoring God means you can look beyond your own concerns and see the needs of others in your life and in the world we live in.
